Lessons are important, but so is disciplined practice. It can even be fun. Here are some guidelines to help you improve your reading and comprehension skills and become a better English student. Learning any new language is a time-consuming process, more than 300 hours from some estimates. Instead of trying and cingling a few hours of review once or per week, most experts say that short, regular study sessions are more effective. Just 30 minutes a day can help you improve your English skills over time. Instead of focusing on a single task for the entire study session, try mixing things up. Study a little grammar, then do a short listening exercise, then maybe read an article on the same topic. Don't do too much, 20 minutes in three different exercises is a lot. The variety will keep you engaged and make the study more fun. Reading English-language newspapers and books, listening to music, or watching TV can also help you improve your written and oral comprehension skills. This way repeatedly, you'll start unconsciously absorbing things like pronunciation, speech patterns, accents, and grammar. Keep the pen and paper handy and write words you read or hear that are unfamiliar. Then do some research to find out what these new words mean. Use them the next time you play roles in a classroom dialogue. Non-native English speakers sometimes struggle with certain word pronunciations because they don't have similar sounds in their native language. Similarly, two words can be syllable, but are pronounced quite different (for example, hard and said), or you may encounter combinations of letters where one of them is silent (for example, K in knife). But truckers aren't the only ones waiting in line at the border. Borders. school senior Melissa Sánchez starts her day at 5:30 a.m., though the class won't start for hours. Sánchez lives in Ciudad Juárez and goes to school across the border in El Paso. Trucks wait in a long queue for border control to cross into the U.S., on the Cordova-Americas border crossing bridge at Ciudad Juarez.
